As we approach Election Day on Tuesday, November 5th, I want to share some thoughts on how we can engage our students in understanding this important civic event in an age-appropriate way. For young children, Election Day provides an opportunity to introduce concepts of citizenship, choice, and community in a positive, supportive context.

For elementary-aged students, we can explain that voting is a way for adults to make choices about their communities, schools, and leaders.

It's helpful to frame the election process as something that helps communities work together and make decisions for everyone's benefit. Families might want to talk about how voting is one way adults show responsibility and help make sure everyone has a voice in important matters.

If your child has questions or concerns, encourage them to share, and consider emphasizing the importance of listening, respect, and understanding that people can have different opinions while still being kind to each other. Our school values of respect, responsibility, and making good choices connect naturally to these ideas, and Election Day offers a real-world example.



Thank you for supporting our students as they grow into thoughtful, respectful, and engaged citizens.

REPORT CARDS & STANDARDS BASED GRADING

Report cards are sent home 3 times per year and are an opportunity for teachers to share students' progress towards standards mastery as well as feedback on their execution of lifelong learning skills – those skills foundational to being a learner.

Academic grading is based on *current*, or *most recent* student understanding of what has been taught and not based on end of year expectations.

Sunnyvale School District utilizes a 4-point rubric to describe student progress towards meeting grade level standards and demonstrating lifelong learning skills.

There are multiple ways to better understand how to read and interpret your child's report card and the rubrics.

SNACK AND CELEBRATION POLICY

Parents please keep in mind with the upcoming Holidays:

Snack and Celebration Policy

(Sunnyvale School District's Student Wellness Regulation)

Sunnyvale School District's Student Wellness Administration Regulation (AR) 5030 states that celebrations during the school day:

Should be limited to once per month:

- Should occur during or after the lunch period; and,
- Food items served during the celebration must be commercially prepared (except fruits & vegetables) and meet nutritional guidelines/standards.

In accordance with California's Nutrition Standards Quick Fact Sheet for Elementary Schools (http://www.cde.ca.gov/ls/nu/he/compfoods.asp), when serving snacks other than fresh fruit and vegetables, portions must be:

- · No more than 175 calories
- · No more than 35% total calories from fat
- · No more than 10% of calories from saturated fat (up to 1 gram)
- · No more than 35% total weight from sugar
- · No trans fat

If "surprise" snacks are brought in, please let the teacher know. Treats will be served after school for students to take home.
